Enrolled in a Livestock 4-H Project?

Planning to Exhibit your 4-H Project Animal? Livestock exhibitors are required to attend the designated tagging dates and to complete a Livestock Nomination Certificate to designate their project animals. 4-H Leaders and FFA advisors will be asked to sign the completed certificates after the tagging to complete the nomination process. In the months leading up to the County Fair, exhibitors will be asked to complete an entry form confirming show intentions and identifying the number of livestock pens needed.

Enrolled in a 4-H Horse Project?

Members looking to participate in 4-H Sanctioned Horse Shows are required to submit a Horse Certificate for their 4-H project horse. Horse Certificates need to be completed every year. Horse Certificates are due on **May 1** to the **County Extension Office** and available on our County Website

Enrolled in the 4-H Rodeo Project?

By State Rodeo Rules, all contestants must have personal accident insurance and a signed and completed rodeo waiver in the State 4-H Office 15 days prior to the participant's first rodeo of the current year in order for the member to compete in Sanctioned 4-H Rodeos.

This includes the completion of the rodeo safety course. If hauling, obtain hauling certificate.

Teens and Finances

Financial literacy and managing money are crucial life skills for youth to learn and understand. Important financial information they should know includes:

3 out of 4 teens don't feel confident in their personal finance knowledge and 73% want more personal finance education

Needs, Wants and Impulse Purchases

Financial literacy is an ongoing process and choosing between wants, needs, and impulse purchases is constant throughout life. Teenagers are heavily influenced by what they see online, friends, and their impulses. These influences blur the difference between wants and needs. Your teen may think they need the latest smartphone, video game, or even a car, and will prepare a well thought out rationale. When your teen presents why they "need" something, be firm and give examples of needs versus wants. Learning to budget and create a savings account to purchase a "want" is a great way to teach delayed gratification, a valued life skill.

Spend Less Than You Earn, Budget, Save, and Invest Early

Most teens understand negative numbers and can be easily related to money. Spending more than they earn, creates a negative balance and no savings. Spend less than they earn, they can pay bills, avoid debt, save for things they want, and invest in their future.

Whether your teen has a job, gets an allowance, or has money from gifts in an account, they should track what they spend and start a simple budget. Most teens are surprised to see where their money goes when they start tracking spending. There are many tools available including budget templates and free apps to help guide and assist them developing a budget.

Encourage teens to set goals for their savings including how much to save, how much for their "wants", and how much to invest. Using visuals helps when teaching about investing showing how even small amounts invested early and regularly grows over time. Perils of Credit Cards and Good vs. Bad Debt

It is imperative to educate teens about the risks of credit cards and the importance of using them properly. Helping them to understand that relying on credit cards can create a vicious cycle of debt, but if used appropriately credit cards can a great tool in building credit.

Understanding the difference between "good" and "bad" debt is helpful when considering a loan. Whether it is a student loan, vehicle loan, or making a credit card charge, it is important to have the understand their potential impact.

"Good debt" can be a loan helping reach a goal. A student loan leading to a degree and employment or advancing a career can be considered good debt. Alternatively, relying solely on student loans can create a large amount of debt.

Depending on the initial amount borrowed, the loan's interest rate, and repayment habits, it can take many years to repay student loans. In a 2013 survey, student loan repayment average was 20 years. Consider all options



loans. In a 2013 survey, student loan repayment average was 20 years. Consider all options before taking out massive student loans.

Often youth are unaware or excluded from family finances and do not understand related challenges. Being transparent, realistic, and allowing them to be active learners in managing finances can be the most influential tool we can use.

HOW TO MAKE A MOTION

All those opposed say, "Nay." If a majority of the members support the motion...President: "Motion passes." If the majority are opposed...President "Motion fails." President taps the gavel.
